SOCI 230 - This course familiarizes beginning students with the basic concepts and methods used by sociologists to study society. It includes culture, social structure, social class, institutions, deviance and social change emphasizing the application of the sociological perspective in analyzing society and human behavior.

SOCI 235 - This course focuses on the sociological approach to social problems including mental illness, crime, poverty, family and community disintegration, violence ecology, and current events.

- Master's degree from a regionally accredited university with a minimum of 18 graduate hours in the discipline
- Three years teaching experience, preferably post-secondary
- Commitment to community college philosophy
- Understanding of and experience with technology as a learning tool, both within and outside the classroom
