HIST 250 – United States History to 1865

This course explores our history from Pre-Colombian times to the Civil War. Search's for a narrative that helps us understand ourselves as a people and a nation in progress. Emphasis is placed on the social, economic, and political forces that have shaped the local and national communities through the colonial and revolutionary periods, as well as the growth and conflict, with emphasis on the national and sectional tensions of the 19thCentury. The contributions of native, ethnic & marginalized peoples are emphasized. This course relies on lecture, video material, student groupwork and individual study and research.
