Cultural Note: this poem is based on the Japanese Obon festival that lasts 3 days in celebration of the sacrifices and love of the dead. On the first day family members hang chochin lanterns and visit the graves of loved ones to invite the spirits to return to the mortal world. On the last day, they set paper lanterns called Toro Nagashi on the water to show the spirits the way back to the spirit world.

JUDGE'S COMMENTS

Ghost Ships centers around the speaker's participation in a Japanese festival that celebrates the deceased. This poem teaches the reader about a unique cultural tradition through beautiful images of floating lanterns: "Tiny ships upon the water/Their lights flickering upon the waves." Not only does this poem depict a particular tradition, the emotional weight of the ritual on the speaker is felt: "As I watch my paper vessels/Sail across the waves to a place I cannot reach."
