### Honorable Mention: "Philanthropic Prince," by Hanna Giles

"Sentable" is a word people in Lesotho use to say "good-bye" that means "forget-me-not," which Prince Harry hoped would keep others from forgetting the necessity of the cause, and also mirrors as a tribute for the similar charities Diana partook in ("Charities"). In similar gratitude, Liz Hughes, the Chief Executive of MapAction, an organization that delivers first-response mapped information about disaster scenes, says "With the support of Prince Harry and fellow guests at our special reception, MapAction can make vital progress in rising to the challenges ahead" ("Prince Harry Celebrates MapAction Achievements"). Prince Harry has embodied hope and salvation for the many lives that these charities affect, showing the world that there are important causes that still require attention.
