

Part-time Instructor - ANATOMY & PHYSIOLOGY I (BIOL 202)

Montcalm Community College is seeking candidates to teach part-time in Anatomy & Physiology I.

**BIOL 202** is an introduction to basic structural and functional aspects of the human body. Specific topics studied include anatomical terminology, chemical basis of life, cells, cellular metabolism, tissues, integumentary system, skeletal system, muscular system, nervous system and special senses. Special emphasis is placed upon homeostatic mechanisms whenever feasible. Laboratory exercises include dissection and physiological experiments pertinent to the topics covered. Students have an option to observe and use a human cadaver. Credit Hours: 4 Contact Hours: 5
