Learn as You Like at MCC

- F2F Live instruction where the instructor and students meet in a traditional classroom setting during a regularly scheduled course time.
- FHYB A class using both F2F and ONL approaches.
- LOL In-person instruction from the comfort of another location through a real-time online presentation, similar to Zoom or a Teams meeting, which allows interaction with the instructor and other students during a regularly scheduled course time.
- LHYB A class using both LOL & ONL approaches.
- ONL Instruction is completely online; however, proctored exams may be required.
- CISOL Coursework may be completed online or at a campus computer lab.

Steps to Register / Additional Information

Step 1: Apply online

Complete MCC's online application for admission at montcalm.edu/apply.

Step 2: Send transcripts

Arrange for official copies of your final high school/GED transcripts and college transcripts (if applicable) to be sent to the MCC Student Services Department at studentservices@montcalm.edu. In order for transcripts to be considered official, they must come directly from the high school or a third party sender and have a graduation date.

Step 3: Technology

Students must activate their MCC student account prior to registration. Visit montcalm.edu/login to complete your **First Time Login** and use the self-service password reset to login for the first time. Your MCC email address is your username. Your **personal email address** and **phone number** you included on the application will be used for verification. For assistance, call the IT Help Desk at **989-328-1246**.

Step 4: Complete Financial Aid

Students are encouraged to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at studentaid.gov. Grants, loans, or work study positions may be available to those who qualify. MCC's school code is 002295. View all MCC scholarship opportunities at montcalm.edu/scholarships.

Step 5: Complete new student orientation online

New student orientation introduces you to MCC services and resources available to facilitate success as a student at MCC. Orientation is optional and offered online or in-person. Visit montcalm.edu/orientation for more information.

Step 6: Placement Assessment

Academic placement is required for students who are pursuing a program of study at MCC. Students must take the Guided Self-Placement regardless of high school GPA. MCC offers Guided Self-Placement where students complete a placement in reading, writing, and math on their own and will receive

feedback to make an informed decision about class placements. Students exempt from the placements are those who have previously completed the ACCUPLACER assessment within the last five years, have earned an associate or higher degree, are age 60 or older, audit classes, or obtain a waiver from the instructor. The academic placement assessments are available at montcalm.edu/placement.

After the placements are complete, students are encouraged to meet with a counselor or advisor for assistance in making an informed decision on course placement. Appointments with a counselor or advisor may be scheduled by calling the Student Success Center at **989-328-1264** or texting the Student Success Center at **989-625-4886**. The academic placement assessments are available at montcalm.edu/placement.

Step 7: Advising/Register

You may register for your classes online at my.montcalm.edu under the Academics tab. You may also make an appointment to meet with a counselor/advisor for assistance with registration by contacting MCC's Student Success Center at studentsuccess@montcalm.edu or calling **989-328-1264**.

Step 8: Pay for classes



Participants will experiment with various glass textures, colors, and bevels to bring their owl creations to life with depth and intricacy, including basic owl anatomy and feather patterns to create a realistic design. General Information

Transfer and articulation

Students can start at Montcalm Community College, complete general education requirements at a fraction of the cost of attending a university or private college, and still go just about anywhere from here to continue their education.

MCC offers over 50 associate degree, certificate and job training programs. The highest degree offered by MCC is the associate degree. Any degree completed at MCC can serve as the starting point for a bachelor's degree, although transfer credits may differ based on program, type of classes and transfer school and major.

MCC participates with the Michigan Transfer Agreement (MTA), which allows students to complete general education requirements at one college or university, then transfer those courses to meet general education requirements at another college or university, without any special exceptions.

Articulation agreements also provide options for seamless transfer into a variety of advanced-degree programs at other institutions.

Academic advising is available to help students determine their program options, course selections and transferability. An appointment may be made by contacting MCC's Student Success Center at studentsuccess@montcalm.edu or call 989-328-1264.

General information Academic Advising

Students are encouraged to meet with a counselor or academic advisor prior to registering. For an appointment, contact MCC's Student Success Center by emailing studentsuccess@montcalm.edu or calling 989-328-1264. Transcripts from high school and any colleges attended should be on file at MCC as well as the academic placement assessments before meeting with an academic counselor or advisor.

Academic Placement

Academic placement is required for new students who are pursuing a program of study at MCC. MCC offers Guided Self-Placement where students complete a self-evaluation in reading, writing, and math on their own and will receive feedback to make a responsible choice about class placements. Students exempt from Guided Self-Placement are those who have earned an associate degree or higher, have completed or transferred in both college level English AND math, are age 60 or older, or audit classes.

After the self-evaluations are completed, students are encouraged to meet with a counselor or advisor for assistance in making an informed decision on course placement. Appointments with a counselor or advisor may be scheduled with the Student Success Center by calling 989-328-1264, texting 989-625-4886, or emailing studentsuccess@montcalm.edu.

Corequisites and Prerequisites

A prerequisite is a requirement that must be successfully completed prior to enrollment in another course. A corequisite is a requirement that must be completed before or at the same time as another course. All exceptions require written departmental approval.

Auditing a Course

Those wishing to audit a course must complete and submit a Course Audit Form, available in Student Services or from my.montcalm.edu under the forms link on the Academics tab. Audit status must be indicated at the time of registration. Students do not receive credit or a grade for audited courses and are not eligible for financial aid or veterans benefits. Completed audit forms can be turned in at registration or faxed to the attention of Enrollment Services at 989-328-1203 or emailed to studentservices@montcalm.edu (please include Course Audit in the subject line).

Tuition & Fees

Please visit montcalm.edu/tuition for current tuition and fee information. Tuition and fees are subject to approval of the MCC Board of Trustees.

Residency

Residents of the MCC district have lived in the Carson City-Crystal, Central Montcalm, Greenville, Lakeview, Montabella, Tri County or Vestaburg public school district for at least six consecutive months prior to the last day of registration for the term for which the student is enrolled. Students are required to furnish proof of residency such as a driver's license or tax receipts.

Refund Policy

Tuition and fees are 100 percent refundable during the enrollment and drop period. No refunds of tuition or fees will be made for withdrawals after the end of the enrollment period. Non-attendance or failure to officially drop classes during the drop period does not cancel the student's responsibility to pay for classes.

Federal Refund Policy for Students Receiving Title IV Aid

Students who receive any form of Federal Title IV Student Financial Aid and withdraw from classes before completing 60 percent of the semester may be required to repay a prorated portion of the federal aid they received.

Payment of Tuition and Fees

Payment for all registration is due by the designated due date for each semester. Due dates are noted in the Academic Calendar on page 23. After the specified date, payment is due at the time of registration.

Payment Options

Tuition and fee payments may be made:

1. **Online at my.montcalm.edu** on the Finances tab, using a credit/debit card (MasterCard, Visa or Discover) or a checking account.
2. **By mail**, using check or money order. Please include the student's name and MCC ID number on the check. Payments should be mailed to: Montcalm Community College, 2800 College Drive, Sidney, MI 48885.
3. **In-person** in the Donald C. Burns Administration/Library Building on MCC's Sidney campus at 2800 College Drive, or in the Stanley and Blanche Ash Technology and Learning Center on MCC's Greenville campus at 1325 Yellow Jacket Drive.
4. **Nelnet payment plan** – MCC offers a convenient monthly budget plan through Nelnet Business Solutions to pay tuition and fees. Students wishing to enroll in the payment plan must be registered for classes and enroll in the plan by the end of drop period. Students may make payments by automatic bank withdrawal or by charging to a credit or debit card (MasterCard, Discover, American Express or Visa). A non-refundable \$25 fee is required to enroll in this plan. There is a \$30 returned payment fee if a payment is returned for non-sufficient funds. If a credit/debit card is used, a convenience fee, in addition to the enrollment fee, will be assessed. To set up a payment plan choose the Set up/Manage Nelnet Payment Plan link on the finances page at my.montcalm.edu.

Tuition / Financial Aid / Dates to Remember

- 1. Financial aid** - For students with completed financial aid files, aid will be applied to student accounts as Estimated Aid. If the award does not cover the balance in full, the student is responsible for paying the difference by the due date. If the student has applied for financial aid but the award does not appear on the account by the due date, the student must be prepared to pay the bill or enroll in the Nelnet payment plan in order to remain registered for classes.
- 2. Employer or sponsoring agency**
– An authorization must be on file with the MCC Business Office by the payment due date in order for MCC to invoice the authorizing agency. A written authorization must be completed each semester. For more information, contact Dean for Occupational Programs & Workforce
- 3. Senior scholarship** – Scholarships are available to persons age 60 or older who reside within the college district and will be subject to requirements currently in effect. Students using this scholarship will be required to pay the material fee and college services fee. Students wishing to use this scholarship must contact the MCC Business Office at busoff@montcalm.edu after they have registered in order to request the scholarship be applied to their account.
