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Nursing is a profession within the healthcare sector that focuses on the care of individuals, families, and communities to maintain or improve their health and well-being. It is both art and science; heart and mind. Nurses use their judgment to integrate objective data with subjective experience of a patient's biological, physical, and behavioral needs. Nursing is a dynamic and evolving field that plays a crucial role in the overall healthcare system.

Why Montcalm Community College?

Montcalm Community College's RN program is accredited by the National League for Nursing Commission for Nursing Education Accreditation (NLN CNEA). Montcalm Community College's RN program is a great place to start your career. It is designed to provide the credits necessary to graduate with an associate of applied science in nursing. Upon completion of MCC's AAS in nursing, the graduate will be prepared to take the NCLEX-RN in Michigan. If students choose to take the NCLEX-RN in a state other than Michigan, they will need to contact that specific board of nursing to ensure requirements are met. We prepare students for employment opportunities as Registered Nurses.

There are different types of nurses with varying levels of education and specialization, including licensed practical nurses (LPNs), registered nurses (RNs), and Advanced Practice Registered Nurses (APRN).

What is a Registered Nurse?

A Registered Nurse (RN) is a healthcare professional who has completed the necessary education and training to become licensed and registered to practice nursing. Every state and the District of Columbia has a board of nursing with a mission of protecting the public from harm. RNs play a key role in providing patient care and are an integral part

of the healthcare team. Registered Nurses work in various healthcare settings, including hospitals, clinics, nursing homes, schools, community health organizations, and more. They contribute significantly to promoting and maintaining the health and well-being of individuals and communities. Here are some key characteristics and responsibilities of Registered Nurses:

Education: RNs typically have a formal education in nursing, which can be obtained through various educational pathways. This includes completing a diploma program, an associate degree in nursing (ADN) or associate of applied science (AAS), or a bachelor's degree in nursing (BSN).

Licensure: After completing their education, individuals must pass a licensing examination to become a registered nurse. Licensing requirements vary by jurisdiction but passing the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses (NCLEX-RN) is a first step.

Patient Care: RNs are involved in direct patient care, including assessing patients' conditions, administering medications, monitoring vital signs, and collaborating with other healthcare professionals to develop and implement care plans.

Critical Thinking: Registered Nurses are skilled in critical thinking and problem-solving. They assess complex situations, make decisions based on their nursing knowledge, and respond to emergencies effectively.

Clinical Judgment: Clinical judgment refers to the process through which registered nurses make decisions about patient care based on their assessment of the situation. It involves analyzing available information, recognizing relevant cues, and drawing conclusions to determine appropriate actions or interventions. Clinical judgment is a critical aspect of healthcare practice, and it relies on a combination of knowledge, experience, critical thinking, and situational awareness. Clinical judgment is not only based on technical knowledge but also incorporates aspects of empathy, cultural competence, and effective communication. It is a dynamic and iterative process that evolves as new information becomes available. The ability to exercise sound clinical judgment is essential for

Specialization: Some RNs choose to specialize in a particular area of nursing, such as maternity, pediatrics, critical care, or mental health. Specialization often involves additional education and training.

Continuing Education: Nursing is a dynamic field, and RNs are encouraged to engage in continuing education to stay updated on the latest healthcare practices and advancements.

To apply for nursing program admission, the following criteria must be met:

1. Overall GPA of 2.0
2. No outstanding financial obligations to MCC
3. Have an activated MCC student email account.
4. Have a completed application for admission.
5. Completed the HESI admission assessment testing - A2 (taken in NADN 108)
6. Completed the following courses with a "C" or better: BIOL 202, MATH (102, 104, 159, or 190), ENGL 100, COMM 220; NADN 108 with a C+ or higher.

Application Cycle

The nursing program admits up to 40 students twice a year. The application cycles are October 1-22 and May 1-15. The October seat acceptance admits students in the spring and the May seat acceptance admits students in the fall. Students are encouraged to meet with a counselor for course selection and application assistance. Admission is competitive. There is no guarantee of admission regardless of completion of minimum course requirement or point rubric total. It is the student's responsibility to understand and adhere to the specific admission criteria. Admission is based on a point system which factors in the GPA of required course, past

educational achievements or certifications, and academic history.

Application Correspondence

Applications will only be accepted during an open application cycle. All application correspondence will be sent to the student's MCC email. If a student is selected to enter the nursing program, a letter of acceptance will be sent via email and the student will have a deadline date to accept their seat offer. If a student is not selected for admission, the student will also be notified by email and will need to re-apply for the next admission application cycle. If an application is received from a non-qualified student or an application is incomplete, students will receive an email with an explanation.

Financial Aid

It is the student's responsibility to discuss eligibility of funding for the complete nursing program with the Financial Aid Office. This includes funding for additional courses beyond the associate degree requirements. MCC's Financial Aid Office may be contacted via (989) 328-1205 or finaid@montcalm.edu. Students should have their financial aid/funding plan in place to be ready for entry.

Immunizations

Please refer to the Health Careers Immunization Worksheet (this can be found on the nursing web page). This is not required as part of the application process but will be needed when accepted into the nursing program. Once accepted into the program, there is a very short window to complete the immunizations and CPR-BLS requirements. It is recommended that students get started on these requirements early. The CPR-BLS must be through the American Heart Association.

BSN Courses

Students who wish to take RN to BSN courses while waiting to enter the nursing program should make an appointment with a counselor or advisor. An appointment may be made by calling **(989) 328-1264**. Contact with the transfer school representative should also be made.



The Nursing Program

The nursing program is designed to be 5 semesters in length. Once admitted into the nursing program, students must successfully complete all semester courses to progress into the following semesters. Please refer to the recommended sequence of courses below.

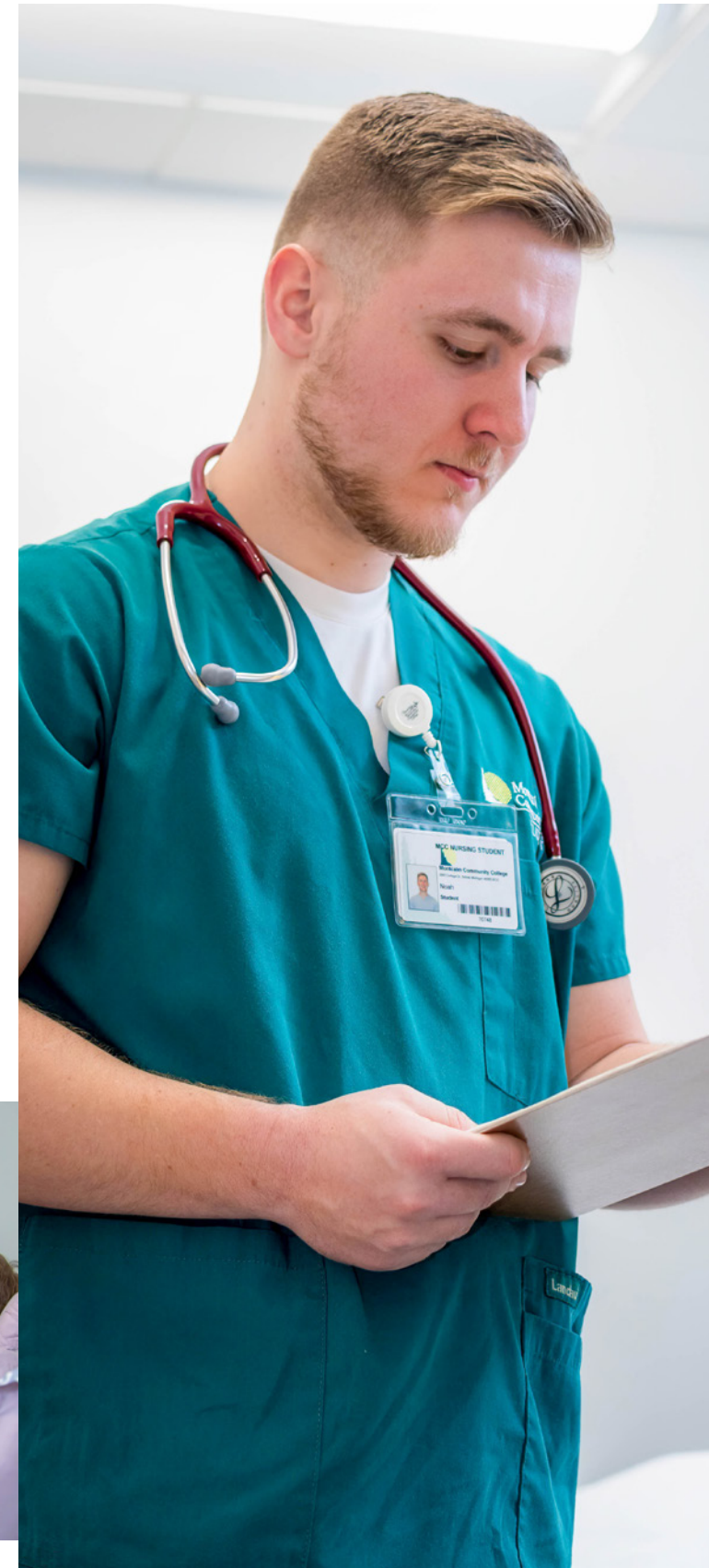

Nursing Application Information

Section 1: GPA Calculated College Course GPA in these courses: BIOL 202, MATH, ENGL 100, COMM 220, NADN 108.

- ENGL 101 will be acceptable if ENGL 100 is not on MCC transcripts with a C or higher.
- AP/CLEP credit is acceptable if applied to the MCC transcript but will not be calculated in GPA.
- Must have a C or higher in BIOL, MATH, ENGL, COMM and a C+ or higher in NADN 108 to apply.
- NADN 108 must be completed at MCC.
- Official transcripts must be on file with Montcalm Community College.

Section II: HESI admission assessment testing – A2 (3 scored areas).

The HESI admission test will be taken one time during NADN 108. It can also be taken a second time during that class and can be re-taken once every 90 days if needed. Results are good for one year prior to the end of the application cycle. The highest score in each individual section is used from each applicable test. Final points are based on the average of each subject. There is no minimum HESI score to apply, however, points are a factor toward admission.

Section III: Highest degrees from a regionally accredited institution.

You may receive points for the highest degree earned. The degree must be from a regionally accredited institution. Only your highest degree earned will be counted, points will not be awarded for multiple degrees. Official transcripts showing degree completion must be on file with Montcalm Community College.

Section IV: Required nursing general education credits taken at MCC

Two (2) points are allowed for each of the required courses completed with a minimum of a C grade at time of application (see full list on page 8).
